 - What sticks out to you (words, phrases, concepts, themes)?
 - Why do these things stick out to you?
 - Does it remind you of other Bible passages?
- 2. Examine the context of the passage:
 - What's happening in the book before and after the passage?
 - What's going on in history at the time of the passage?
 - What type of literature or genre is the passage?
- 3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

- 4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
- 5. What does the Lord say in Isaiah 57:15 about himself, about those who can dwell with him, and about what he does for them? What does it mean to be contrite or lowly, and why does the Lord desire and honor that?

APPLICATION

- 6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
- 7. How can you demonstrate a "contrite and lowly spirit" (57:15) before the Lord this week? What does that look like in your prayer life, your relationships with others, and how you talk about yourself?

- 7. What can you do to help the needy this month (the hungry, poor, etc.)? Does this feel hard to do? Why or why not?

ISAIAH 59

- 5. Which is harder for you to believe: that God opposes sin or that he forgives sin? Why? Why is verse 20 important in explaining God's response to sin?

APPLICATION

- 6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
- 7. Much of this passage is grieving the pervasiveness of sin. Where does sin exist in your life, family, church, or community? Lament that sin before God and ask him to change it by the power of the Redeemer (v. 20).

OBSERVATION

- 1. What are your personal observations about the passage?
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- 2. Examine the context of the passage:
 - What's happening in the book before and after the passage?
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 - What type of literature or genre is the passage?
- 3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

- 4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
- 5. What truth from Good Friday or Easter services struck you the most and why? Was it something new or different, or was it a reminder of something you already knew?

APPLICATION

- 6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
- 7. When was the last time you shared about the death and resurrection of Jesus with someone who isn't a Christian? What can you do this month to open the door for you to have this type of conversation?
- 8. This week, thank God for defeating evil, sin, and death through Jesus's resurrection. If you are struggling with one of these (for example getting mistreated, battling sin, or experiencing a loved one close to death), tell the Lord and praise him for his coming kingdom where there will be no more tears or pain.

ISAIAH 62



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OBSERVATION

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- 2. Examine the context of the passage:
 - What's happening in the book before and after the passage?
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 - What type of literature or genre is the passage?
- 3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

- 4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
- 5. What does the emotional language in verse 4 say to you: "you shall be called My Delight Is in Her...for the Lord delights in you"? Is it difficult to imagine God taking this kind of delight in his messy people or in you? Why or why not?

APPLICATION

- 6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
- 7. What aspect of your identity as part of God's people do you need to remember and live out this week (v. 12)?
 - Being holy "The Holy People"
 - Acting as if you've been rescued "The Redeemed of the Lord"
 - Taking comfort that God's love pursued you "Sought Out"
 - Having hope that God will never forsake you "A City Not Forsaken"

ISAIAH 63



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- 3. What was one of your main takeaways from Sunday's sermon?

INTERPRETATION

- 4. What questions does this passage raise for you?
- 5. Is the Lord severe or kind? Angry or loving? Which verses support the various sides of God's disposition towards his people? How can seemingly conflicting characteristics both be true? How does the story of salvation display this?

APPLICATION

- 6. How should you apply this passage to your life? Consider how it applies to your thoughts, attitudes, habits, decisions, relationship with God, and relationships with others.
- 7. In what way(s) are you tempted to grieve the Holy Spirit right now (v. 10; see also Eph. 4:30)? What can you specifically confess and repent of to your group and/or in your time with God this week? Remember: "When we go into repentance, our experience of our complex God becomes simple—steadfast love through the blood of the Lamb" (Ray Ortlund, *Isaiah: God Saves Sinners*, 428).

- 7. How often does your hope in earthly circumstances turn out favorably? How often do you place your hope in the new heavens and new earth (65:17; see also Rev. 21)? What would it look like for you to transition your hope more fully towards the coming new heavens and new earth (ex. greater patience, trust, worship, endurance, etc.)?
