- 1. Some popular views
 - Romantic feelings
 - Physical attraction
 - Sex love equals sex
 - Need fulfilling love is meeting my needs
 - Benefiting love is because of the benefits
- 2. Biblical view (1 Cor 13:4-7)
 - Patient not hasty in anger or punishment, but longsuffering
 - Kind willing to help or assist; do good to someone else
 - Not envious to be zealous for something; envious of what someone is getting or not getting
 - Not boastful to brag or tout your wares
 - Not arrogant pride and puffed up; inflated view of self
 - Not rude act unbecomingly, ugly and inappropriately
 - Not insisting on its own way to seek and go after one's own selfish pursuits
 - Not irritable to be provoked or roused to anger in the mind
 - Not resentful to hold account of someone's wrong doings
 - Not rejoicing at wrongdoing not happy about wrong being done by anyone
 - Rejoices with truth happy with the truth; rejoice with the Word and truth in relationships
 - Bears all things hides and covers the faults of others
 - Believes all things believes what others say unless given proof otherwise; is not skeptical
 - Hopes all things knows and believes the promises of God; is not cynical
 - Endures all things remains under trial and suffering; perseveres

- 4. Practical ways for a husband to love his wife
 - Telling her (verbal & non-verbal)
 - Appreciating her
 - Making time for her—requires scheduling
 - Communicating
 - Sharing (thoughts, concerns, fears, hopes, etc.)
 - Providing for her (Eph 5:29; 1 Tim 5:8)
 - Promoting her growth and development
 - Treating her as priority—Your love for her should supersede all other loves in your life (except love for God)
 - Initiating love—You don't wait, but take the lead
 - As you love yourself (Eph 5:28-29)
 - Includes cherishing and nourishing

He is a of his wife (1 Pet 3:7)

- 1. The Command—Our culture says you can't understand a woman. Yet God says not only that you can, but that you must.
 - Takes time—If God says to do it, you have the time; you must prioritize it
 - Takes effort
- 2. The Result—You live with your wife in an understanding way (1 Pet 3:7)
- 3. The Effect—Your wife's problem is your problem. If it's important to her, it must be to you as well.

He is a for his wife

- 1. What Godly Leadership is NOT:
 - A dictatorship (Matt 20:25) Pagans exercise dominion and want to control.
 - \rightarrow He doesn't demand submission.
 - \rightarrow His home is not his castle.
 - \rightarrow He doesn't expect his wife to serve him.
 - → He doesn't force his wife to accept his opinion or preference.
 - \rightarrow He is not mean and does not use anger to get his way.
 - Making all the decisions
 - → Not enough time to make all of them
 - → Not his responsibility to make them alone—He's a team leader
 - \rightarrow He needs her insights.
 - \rightarrow She will be his best counselor.
 - ightarrow He will listen to his wife but check out what she says with the Word of God.
 - Following your wife (1 Cor 11:3, 7-9; Eph 5:23)

2. What Godly Leadership IS:

- Practically
 - → Other-oriented = his concern is for her needs and desires
 - \rightarrow Goal-oriented = he knows where he is leading his wife and family
 - → Sets an example of control—Phil 4:9; Prov 23:26
 - → Solves problems biblically = solution—oriented
 - → Instructs not as her father but as a team leader and discipler
 - → Motivates—helps her grow in her walk with the Lord and in her God-given responsibilities
 - → Coaching—encouraging her as he comes alongside of her
 - → Managing—1 Tim 3:4, 5, 12—sees his wife as his fellow heir in Christ
 - → Pleasantness—Eccles. 9:9—He lives joyfully with his wife, and he is fun to live with and have around
